

# **SMALL BUSINESS SUPPORT HUBS PROGRAM**

## **OVERVIEW**

The Small Business Support Hubs (SBSH) program aims to establish and strengthen inclusive, accessible and effective regional ecosystems for entrepreneurs through the deployment of \$75 million in American Rescue Plan funding. The SBSH program will support small businesses disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 through investment into entrepreneurial hubs across the state.

The SBSH program will build upon the 20 years of MEDC SmartZone success by creating a statewide network of entrepreneurial hubs equipped to serve the needs of small businesses through direct support and network referral relationships.

## **OBJECTIVES**

- Support small businesses disproportionately impacted by COVID-19
- Strengthen and establish locally relevant, regionally based ecosystems to cultivate a more inclusive, accessible and effective entrepreneurial ecosystem
- Position small business support hubs to increase the number of businesses served through new and scaled programming, technical assistance and other support services
- Increase access to regional, statewide and national small business support resources
- Expand geographic reach of network partners into underserved and rural areas
- Raise the national profile of Michigan's small business ecosystem

## **ENTREPRENEURIAL HUBS**

Eligible entrepreneurial hubs are entities that have a **physical space** that provides **training and resources** to entrepreneurs through a combination of direct services, remote services, and referral relationships.

- Direct services include on-site support through staff, contractors, or strategic partnerships
- **Remote services** include off-site support through field staff, contractors, or strategic partnerships
- **Referral relationships** meaning partnerships with organizations, entities or individuals with distinct or complementary technical or culturally competent expertise

The types of training and resources provided to entrepreneurs through hubs might include one-on-one coaching, consultations, workshops, seminars, cohort-based learning, incubation activities, accelerator activities, networking and mentorship opportunities and events.

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

An eligible applicant must be a non-profit organization that self-identifies as an entrepreneurial hub, is headquartered in Michigan and is in good standing with the state. Upon selection, awardees must also be registered or able to register for a federal Unique Entity ID and be eligible to do business with the federal government.

Eligible applicants can include organizations such as:

- Existing MEDC SmartZones
- Business service organizations
- Entrepreneurial hubs and business accelerators and incubators
- Tribal entities
- Entities serving small business owners in underrepresented communities
- Applicants contracting third-parties to plan, execute and manage small business support services

#### **TIMELINE**

Applications will be accepted from July 10, 2023, to Sept. 8, 2023. Detailed information will be provided to all interested parties via a webinar on July 11, 2023, and the recording will be made available following the event.

- Application window: July 10, 2023 Sept. 8, 2023
- Application review: September October 2023
- Awardees announced: November December 2023
