Small Business Support Hubs Program Overview

The Small Business Support Hubs (SBSH) program will cultivate a more inclusive, accessible and integrated entrepreneurial ecosystem through investments in operations and programming, business support services and direct grants to eligible small businesses.

Twenty-seven Small Business Support Hubs were selected to receive funding through this program and are anticipated to support 20,000 Michigan businesses over the next three years. The program will leverage the knowledge of more than 20 years of Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) SmartZone impact to create a statewide network of entrepreneurial hubs equipped to serve the launch, sustainability and growth needs of small businesses through direct support and network referral relationships.

The program is funded by a one-time appropriation using American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars to create and operate programs to support small businesses disproportionately impacted by COVID-19.

Program Goals

The SBSH program will:

- Position Support Hubs to increase the number of businesses served through new and scaled programming, technical assistance and other support services.
- Increase access to regional and statewide small business support resources.
- Expand the geographic reach of network partners into underserved and rural areas.
- Raise the national profile of Michigan's small business ecosystem.

Battle Creek Food Reimagined | Battle Creek Unlimited



Summary:

Battle Creek Food Reimagined (BCFR) is part of Battle Creek Unlimited, an economic development organization that serves Battle Creek. BCFR's vision is to become a vibrant and inclusive food innovation hub for startups and young food companies to thrive in southwest Michigan.

BCFR leverages the city's legacy in food innovation, aggregation of food assets and community engagement that makes it the perfect location for a food innovation hub. The Support Hub designation complements BCFR's SmartZone, enabling it to increase capacity, deliver food sector-specific programming and provide access to accelerator-licensed food facilities.

Some of the planned programming in collaboration with its partners include:

- Food and beverage incubator programming for startups
- Food and beverage cohort-based accelerator for early and growth-stage
- Food finance accelerator
- Investor's network
- Food entrepreneurial networking events
- Access to BCFR's food manufacturing ecosystem and business support

BCFR is working towards a centralized food hub that will include an accelerator kitchen, demo kitchen and small-scale food manufacturing space (not yet available).

Central Upper Peninsula Small Business Support Hub

Summary:

Alongside identified strategic partners, the Lake Superior Community Partnership (LSCP) has established the Central Upper Peninsula Support Hub. The support hub will contract with partner organizations to place small business resource navigators on the ground in seven counties to help small businesses understand their needs and available resources to address them. The support hub will serve as a central location for small business efforts in the region, reducing overlap and meeting businesses where they are. Additionally, the support hub will expand the availability of resources from the LSCP, Innovate Marquette, and Accelerate UP to all seven counties (currently, most are only available in Marquette County) and connect businesses to student teams from Northern Michigan University to address identified challenges via the new NMU Main Street Program.

Funds will also be used to purchase software that is otherwise unavailable in the region and cover marketing costs to maximize outreach. Activities of the support hub will be overseen by a strategic advisory council consisting of seven partners: the LSCP; Accelerate UP; Innovate Marquette; NMU; SBDC; Keweenaw Bay Indian Community; and Sault Tribe Inc.; each of which will bring expertise, resources and networks to benefit the support hub's work.

Centrepolis Accelerator @ Lawrence Technology University

Summary:

The Centrepolis Accelerator is accelerating the growth of Michigan's advanced manufacturing, innovative hardware entrepreneurs and small manufacturers by providing access to funding, experts and key business and product development resources. The Support Hub will bolster the operations and programming of Centrepolis, focusing on expanding crucial product development and lab prototyping services tailored to aid small businesses adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. The proposed initiatives encompass a comprehensive suite of services:

- Idea 2 Product Cohort: A structured program guiding entrepreneurs through the ideation and product conceptualization phases.
- Customer Creation and Growth Cohort: Targeted support for small businesses to enhance customer acquisition and foster sustainable growth.
- Product Development Services: Specialized assistance to refine and optimize product development processes, ensuring efficiency and innovation.
- Prototyping: Access to state-of-the-art lab facilities for prototype creation, enabling businesses to bring their ideas to life.
- Tech-Thursdays Entrepreneurial Training: Regular training sessions aimed at equipping entrepreneurs with the latest technological insights and business strategies.

In addition to these operational enhancements, Centrepolis plans the allocation of over \$400,000 in direct grants to small businesses. This financial infusion will provide a lifeline to enterprises grappling with the economic fallout of the pandemic, fostering resilience and enabling them to navigate the current challenges effectively. The multifaceted approach outlined in this proposal underscores a commitment to not only revive small businesses but to also empower them with the tools and resources needed for long-term success in an evolving business landscape.

With this immediate funding, Chippewa County Economic Development Corporation (CCEDC) and Headwaters North intend to add skilled professionals with expertise in finance, marketing and general business services to serve as the entrepreneurial hub to deliver training and coaching services to small businesses impacted by COVID-19. The hub will function as a centralized resource center and ecosystem that assists small businesses at various stages of their business. This arrangement will provide the region with a Small Business Support Hub that can provide invaluable resources to businesses in need of guidance. Supported by Chippewa, Luce and Mackinac counties, Bay Mills Tribe and Sault Tribe, we intend to provide available office space, mentorship programs, training, workshops, assistance with access to funding points, networking events, incubation of business startups, market research and help in obtaining legal assistance. By dedicating personnel and staff from Headwaters North, the region can benefit by utilizing a much-needed business support resource in the eastern Upper Peninsula for both the near and long term.

Detroit Economic Growth Association

Summary:

The Detroit Economic Growth Association (DEGA) Support Hub will provide a suite of business assistance and financial support to Detroit's small businesses through a network of community-based physical sites across the city of Detroit, including Highland Park. The hubs will be managed by DEGA in collaboration with six organizations.

DEGA will coordinate support by centering business owners and shepherding and strengthening support across organizations. In this way, business assistance will not be siloed, but be provided as part of an overall strategy to maximize the potential for success for each business. District business liaisons will help entrepreneurs to navigate city departments and troubleshoot issues.

Programming will be delivered by six organizations in addition to DEGA: Black Leaders Detroit, Build Institute, Highland Park Community Kitchen, Metro Detroit Black Business Alliance, Milestone Growth Capital and ProsperUs.

The DEGA Support Hub will serve 3,000 small businesses over a three-year period and will be accessible remotely and at 20+ physical locations. The physical locations are located in 16 different zip codes in the city of Detroit and Highland Park, where a total of approximately 540,000 people reside and 10,583 businesses are licensed.

Eastern Michigan Small Business Network

Summary:

Eastern Michigan Small Business Network (EM-SBN) intends to: expand the SBDC's counseling services across Region 6, including into underserved and rural areas; grow the Port Huron SmartZone-Support Hub to serve technology and non-technology small and startup businesses by establishing affiliate locations in all counties of Region 6; establish geographically located referral services in legal, accounting/finance, marketing, translation, and other sectors; administer small business grants; assist in launching two new co-working facilities in the region; and effectively administer and market these programs and resources.

The scope of work will include hiring 2.5 new Small Business Development Center counselors through a sub-recipient agreement, and one grant manager/program administrator position at EM-SBN. In addition, EM-SBN will extend its Emerge Fund pre-seed fund and eight-week bootcamp to companies located in the region.

Flint and Genesee Economic Alliance

Summary:

Flint & Genesee Economic Alliance and its partners propose an expansive endeavor to bolster small businesses in Genesee County, especially those affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. This ambitious initiative revolves around unprecedented technical support and assistance tailored for SEDI-owned businesses. The strategy emphasizes capacity-building within the economic alliance, augmenting existing services and introducing wraparound support. Essential components include data-informed counseling, capital access coaching, personal finance mentorship and robust networking opportunities. A small business help desk will serve as the primary touchpoint, connecting businesses to vital resources. Expansion plans include the launch of affiliate hub locations across the county, necessitating critical staffing enhancements. Collaborations with prominent partners, such as SBDC, Doxa Development, Metro Community Development and Flint & Genesee Business Bridge, enrich the array of available services, from financial management to mentorship and networking. The varied programs offered by our partners will empower entrepreneurs and connect SEDIowned businesses, also enabling participants to become eligible for a regranting opportunity.

Ultimately, this initiative aims to cultivate a robust support ecosystem, offering tailored aid and fostering growth for small businesses within the county.

Great Lakes Bay - Small Business Hub

Summary:

The Great Lakes Bay-Small Business Hub (GLB-SBH) is a collaborative effort designed to strengthen the existing entrepreneurial hub created through the SmartZone networks established over 20 years ago.

The GLB-SBH's three main goals include:

- Strengthening small business satellite hubs in four existing CoWork-RC facilities in Isabella, Bay, Midland and Saginaw counties. The GLB-SBH will increase operational and capacity-building support, increase the geographic reach of the small business support delivered and provide direct business support to small businesses focusing on minority-owned business inclusion.
- True magic lies in the connectivity of partners and resources that exist. The
 core of the partnerships around the Support Hub includes CMURC, regional
 chambers of commerce, economic development organizations and the Small
 Business Development Center (SBDC). All these partners work alongside each
 other and support one another at a high level across the region.
- A new collaboration for expanded services was also created in Clare County, located at the Harrison Market, in partnership with the Middle Michigan Development Corporation (MMDC).

Summary:

The Lean Rocket Lab is a co-working and meeting space, startup incubator, and Industry 4.0 business accelerator located in Jackson. It serves as a hub for innovation, entrepreneurship and economic development.

Lean Rocket Lab will expand its LOCAL program in the following ways:

Elevate the annual capacity of the LOCAL Fellows Cohort Program from 10 to 30 or more teams, while also introducing a fast track to lending readiness component (1:1 technical assistance) to expedite businesses' path to securing capital.

Form satellite hubs to extend the program's reach from Jackson County to encompass Hillsdale and Lenawee counties through sub-awardee agreements with Lenawee Now and Hillsdale EDP

Elevate the caliber and quantity of technical assistance through strategic partnerships with American 1 Credit Union and SBDC to drive lending readiness

LEAP and its management of the Lansing Regional SmartZone act as "air traffic control" for the region to direct businesses, whether they are at the idea stage or a Fortune 500 business, to the right resources at the right time. Michigan Founders Fund

Summary:

Michigan Founders Fund (MFF) is the largest network of high-growth founders and investors in the state. MFF's network of entrepreneurs and investors have each pledged 1% of equity or carry to support impactful local organizations throughout the state who are doing the work to better our communities and enrich quality of life

MFF will strengthen and expand its existing support for high-growth founders throughout Michigan. Additionally, it is launching the Michigan Tech Equity Accelerator, which will close the opportunity gap for early-stage (seed or pre-seed stage, high-growth companies looking to scale) SEDI entrepreneurs by providing proven and focused startup training, skills, resources and networks over a 12-week timeframe.

The accelerator will incorporate a mastermind model approach and follow core Michigan Founders Fund principles, focusing on founder fellowship that is built upon shared exchange and deeper connectivity to each cohort participant. Some sessions will even be led by the founder participants through their own business case studies. There will be two accelerator cohorts offered annually, each cohort serving up to 15 individual SEDI entrepreneurs (up to 30 total served annually).

MTEC SmartZone

Summary:

MTEC SmartZone is proposing a multi-tiered initiative designed to bring together regional small-business support partners and provide stage-appropriate assistance to small businesses within the Keweenaw area and the broader Upper Peninsula.

This program will support small businesses through in-depth, tailored support through new and existing programs; standardized direct programming and services; and educational programming, online resources, coaching and educational events to capitalize on regional strengths and address the challenges unique to the region through a partnership between MTEC, KEDA and other regional partners.

Even during COVID-19, MTEC was able to continue to expand its offerings and improve its outcome metrics while expanding existing, successful programs and initiatives in scope and geography within the highlighted counties and broader Upper Peninsula (all rural areas impacted by COVID-19).

Muskegon Innovation Hub

Summary:

The Muskegon Innovation Hub aims to support small businesses impacted by COVID-19 and strengthen the West Michigan ecosystem, including creating a business accelerator for underserved businesses, fostering inclusivity through partnerships, expanding outreach and elevating Michigan's small business profile nationally. Proposed activities encompass an accelerator program, an artist gala, a lecture series, workspace enhancement, staffing, CRM software upgrade, marketing and coach certification.

Anticipated outcomes involve delivering effective coaching, supporting 35 underserved businesses, engaging 40 local artists, improving workspace for 150 entrepreneurs and reaching 250 entrepreneurs through lectures. The initiative strives to bolster economic growth and community resilience in West Michigan.

Small Business Development Center (SBDC) Tech Team

The SBDC provides consulting to innovative tech companies through its "Tech Team" of business consultants who have many years of first-hand experience launching and growing high-tech companies. Their background in tech sectors including life sciences, IT, advanced manufacturing and mobility enables them to provide indepth support that is essential to the inception and expansion of companies built on cutting-edge technologies. https://michigansbdc.org/

Business Accelerator Fund (BAF)

The <u>Business Accelerator Fund (BAF)</u> is available to participating business accelerators in Michigan's statewide <u>SmartZone</u> network. These funds are used toward the delivery of highly specialized services to their clients that are not otherwise available from these business accelerators. Participating business accelerators engage third party specialists to help advance the client's path to commercialization, company success and economic impact for the state of Michigan.

- BAF funds are awarded to accelerators through a competitive review process.
- A company may receive up to \$50,000 in BAF services, often via multiple engagements.
- BAF is administered by the SBDC. Companies interested in participating are encouraged to contact the nearest SmartZone.

Emerging Technologies Fund (ETF)

The Michigan Emerging Technologies Fund (ETF) is administered by the SBDC and is designed to expand funding opportunities for Michigan technology-based companies in the federal innovation research and development arena by providing match dollars (of up to \$25,000 for Phase I and up to \$125,000 for Phase II) to eligible Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) or Small Business Technology Transfer (STTR) proposals. Approved ETF applications receive a letter of support to include with their SBIR/STTR proposal. NOTE – you must have the SBDC support letter BEFORE you submit for the federal award, otherwise you will not be eligible to apply. For more information and to apply visit the SBDC website.

Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) & Small Business Technology Transfer (STTR) Grant Application Assistance

BBCetc provides group training and one-on-one proposal development consulting to Michigan's technology-based entrepreneurs and early-stage companies. The program's goal is to increase Michigan's share of Federal SBIR and STTR funding by enhancing the competitiveness of SBIR/STTR proposals. Support covers applications to all 11 participating federal agencies including NIH, NSF, DoD and DoE and requires a non-refundable participation fee of \$500, which provides up to 15 hours of one-on-one assistance, access to agency tools and templates as appropriate and a reduced rate for on-site training sessions for all individuals from an organization. http://bbcetc.com/

Design for Michigan Manufacturing Program

Administered by the LTU Centrepolis Accelerator, Design for Michigan Manufacturing Program (DFMM) provides critical design for manufacturability services to ensure products and technologies are developed to be durable, reliable and at the right price points to ensure sustainable businesses. This is accomplished by utilizing 30+ Manufacturing Experts in Residence (MEiRs), professionals with 20+ years of experience in design, engineering, materials, prototyping, testing, machine design and production processes. DFMM clients are also connected to promising hardware companies to Michigan manufacturers for both supplier and customer relationships.

Equity Funding

Michigan Rise Pre-Seed Fund

<u>The Michigan Rise Pre-Seed Fund</u> is administered by the Michigan State University Foundation through Michigan Rise which is a fully owned subsidiary of the Foundation. Michigan Rise supports entrepreneurs and technology startups across Michigan through capital support, coaching, assistance with grant funding and more. Funding amounts may be awarded for approved applicants through the fund in the range of \$50,000 to \$250,000.

Michigan Innovate Capital Fund Program

The Michigan Innovate Capital Fund (MICF) Program awarded funding to multiple non-profit organizations that operate fund programs to invest in pre-seed and startup-stage competitive edge technologies that require capital in the earliest stages of the commercialization process.

Michigan University Innovation Capital Fund and Consortium is a collaborative effort between the University of Michigan's Innovation Partnerships and Michigan State University, Michigan State University Research Foundation, Wayne State University, Western Michigan University and Michigan Technological University. U-M's Innovation Partnerships will manage this new venture fund that is designed to unleash university innovation to drive economic growth by investing in early-stage startups that are based on research from Michigan's public universities.

The Biosciences Research and Commercialization Center Fund provides startup and gap funding to promising Michigan-based life sciences and medical device ventures entering the commercialization phase of development. Eligible companies must have a substantial presence or business link to the State of Michigan. The BRCC is required by legislation to structure any funding with the potential to achieve a return on its investment. Investments range from \$25,000 to \$250,000 per deal. The BRCC Fund is managed by Biosciences Research & Commercialization Center of Western Michigan University.

The First Capital Fund (FCF) provides an initial investment that is typically up to \$150,000 with follow-on opportunities. The fund is milestone-driven and focused on helping companies achieve additional funding from angel or venture investors within 12 months. FCF is for new technology companies at the earliest stages of commercialization in Michigan seeking pre-seed and seed stage investment. FCF is managed by ID Ventures.

<u>Michigan Outdoor Innovation Fund</u> has been established to support entrepreneurs across Michigan in the outdoor recreation industry. The Fund will make investments ranging from \$50,000 to \$250,000 in promising Michigan-based startups that are commercializing cutting-edge technologies in outdoor recreation. The Fund is the first of its kind in the Upper Peninsula, the only seed fund in any rural location across Michigan. The Fund is managed by InvestUP.

<u>SPARK Pre-Seed Fund III</u> supports entrepreneurs and technology startups across Michigan through capital support, coaching, assistance with grant funding and more. Funding amounts may be awarded for approved applicants through the fund in the range of \$50,000 to \$250,000.
