a. **Resolution 2026-043 Y Site, LLC MCRP Other Economic Assistance Equity Agreement Amendment**

Julius Edwards, Managing Director of Real Estate and Underwriting, provided the Board with information on the requested action. The request involves the consideration of a resolution to approve an amendment to the Michigan Community Revitalization Program Other Economic Assistance Equity Agreement to Y Site, LLC. The amendment request includes a request to waive existing accrued returns due to the MSF in the amount estimated to be approximately \$800,000 and amend the equity repayment structure to a 35/65 split, with 35% of distributable cash flow going to Michigan Strategic Fund and 65% going to the development team. The 35/65 split will be applied retroactively to the time of the MSF disbursement. Staff is also seeking approval to allow for conversion of unoccupied commercial space into live/work rental

units. All other terms of the current Agreement will remain materially unchanged.

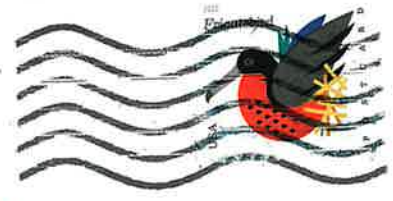

I am writing to offer my full support of the modification request from Y SITE, LLC to modify its Michigan Community Revitalization Program (MCRP) award, originally approved on February 17, 2018 for the development of the Metro Place Apartments, a 145-unit residential project.

Following the initial approval, Y SITE, LLC proceeded diligently. However, the project was significantly impacted by the unprecedented disruptions associated with the COVID-19 pandemic. These circumstances resulted in significant construction delays, material cost increases, labor shortages, and other unanticipated financial burdens. Additionally, the project encountered unexpected bad soils and environmental contamination, which required substantial change orders and contributed further to cost overruns. Despite these extraordinary challenges, the development was successfully completed but received their Certificate of Occupancy in May 2020, at the height of the COVID crisis.

In light of these factors, the proposed modification—adjusting the repayment structure to a 65/35 percent split until the MEDC achieves a 6% internal rate of return—is a reasonable and necessary revision. This adjustment will support the continued financial stability of the project while ensuring that the state ultimately receives an appropriate return on its investment.



I am writing to express our strong support for Y SITE, LLC's request to modify its Michigan Community Revitalization Program (MCRP) award, originally approved on February 17, 2018, for the development of Metro Place Apartments, a 145-unit residential project.

Although Y SITE, LLC moved forward promptly after approval, the project encountered unprecedented challenges stemming directly from the COVID-19 pandemic, which caused material shortages, labor disruptions, construction delays, and substantial cost overruns. These conditions were compounded by unforeseen bad soils, environmental contamination, and the resulting change orders; all of which materially affected the project's budget and timeline. Despite these obstacles, Y SITE, LLC successfully completed the project and received their COO in 2020 May, right in the deep crisis of the COVID epidemic.

Given these extraordinary circumstances, the proposed modification—adjusting the repayment structure to a 65/35 percent split until the MEDC realizes a 6% internal rate of return—is both reasonable and essential to ensuring long-term financial viability for this community investment. This amendment would allow the development to stabilize while still delivering a strong, measurable return to the State.

Beyond its financial justification, Metro Place Apartments has already demonstrated meaningful community and economic benefits. The project has played a key role in revitalizing the surrounding area, improving the overall character and functionality of the neighborhood, and supporting nearby businesses.
