SB 690	123	7/1/2020	Michigan Agricultural Safety Grant Program: The legislature appropriated \$15 million in federal CARES Act funding to support the needs of Michigan's agricultural processors and farms in responding to COVID-19. A total of \$10 million was available to processors statewide and \$5 million was available to farms statewide. Applications were processed by East Lansing-based GreenStone Farm Credit Services.	On July 7 2020, the MSF Board approved the Agricultural Safety Grant Program as well as guidelines consistent with PA 123, and waived the MSF background review policy (Resolution 2020-085). SB 690	123	7/1/2020	Michigan Small Business Restart Grant Program: The legislature appropriated \$100 million in federal CARES Act funding to reduce the economic impact of the ongoing pandemic on Michigan small businesses and workers. The MSF was charged with creating and operating the program in coordination with local economic development organizations (EDOs). The program is similar to the Michigan Small Business Relief Program (MSBRP) launched by the MEDC in March 2020.	On July 7, 2020, the MSF Board approved the Restart Program as well as guidelines consistent with PA 123, and allocations to local EDOs (Resolution 2020-086). HB 5265	144	7/31/2020	Michigan Small Business Restart Grant Program: Since enactment of the PA 123, appropriation legislation was enacted that included provisions allowing eligibility of previously prohibited MSBRP grant recipients under the Restart Program, provided the aggregate grant amount for such prior recipients under the Restart Program and MSBRP does not exceed \$20,000.	On July 23, 2020, the MSF Board approved amendments to the July 7, 2020, guidelines to make changes consistent with Act 144 (Resolution 2020-094). (Note: The resolution was adopted contingent upon the governor signing the bill.)
HB 5396	166	9/30/2020	Coronavirus Relief Fund Grants: The FY 2021 Omnibus Budget appropriated \$10 million as one-time appropriations and authorized distribution of funding to eight organizations that are summarized in the bill.	
HB 6119	205	10/15/2020	Convention Center COVID-19 Relief Program: The State Convention Facility Development Act was amended to transfer \$10 million from the Conventional Facility Development Fund to the General Fund in the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020, with up to \$4 million distributed to the MSF to award grants to qualified convention centers.	On October 27, 2020, the MSF Board approved program guidelines consistent with PA 205 and delegation of authority for the MSF Fund Manager and MSF President to approve awards under the program (Resolution 2020-137).
SB 748	257	12/29/2020	Michigan Stages Survival Grant Program: The legislature appropriated \$3.5 million to provide relief funding to help meet the urgent needs of live music and entertainment venues impacted by the COVID-19 virus and recent MDHHS epidemic orders.	On January 14, 2021, the MSF Board approved funding, program guidelines, waived the MSF background review policy, and authorized the Michigan Independent Venue and Promoter Association (MIVPA) to administer the program (Resolution 2021-001). SB 748	257	12/29/2020	Michigan Small Business Survival Grant Program: The legislature appropriated \$55 million to support the needs of small businesses that experienced a significant financial hardship due to the COVID-19 emergency "gatherings and face mask order" issued by MDHHS. The MSF was charged with creating and operating the program in coordination with local economic development organizations (EDOs).	On January 14, 2021, the MSF Board approved funding allocations, program guidelines, and waived the MSF background review policy (Resolution 2021-002). SB 54	343	12/30/2020	Historic Preservation Tax Credits: The enacted legislation amended the Income Tax Act to reinstate a state level income tax credit for the rehabilitation of certain historic buildings. It includes both personal and business income tax credits and is available to the owners of personal residential and commercial properties. The Michigan State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) may promulgate rules and collect fees to administer the program.	SHPO was in the process of developing rules for adoption by the MSF Board before going through the state rule making process. However, in doing so, it became apparent that, in its current form, the enacted legislation does not provide specific direction in a couple of areas, making the program difficult to implement and administer. The bill sponsor recently indicated he will work with Treasury and SHPO to address these issues in new legislation that will be introoduced in 2021. Rule development is on hold pending approval of the new legislation.
