# Michigan Film Incentives

FY 2025: October 1, 2024 – September 30, 2025

## **Tax Credit Program:**

As of December 31, 2011, the Film and Digital Media Production Assistance Program has been operating within the scope of Section 29 of Public Act 270 of 1984, the Michigan Strategic Fund (MSF) Act (MCL 125.2029a), and no longer approves new film tax credit applications under Section 455 of Public Act 36 of 2007, the Michigan Business Tax Act (MCL 208.1455). However, previously approved projects may be issued a post-production tax credit certificate after the project is complete. In FY 2025, there were no post-production certificates for the tax credit issued.

As of September 30, 2025, a total of \$292,416,203.19 in film tax credits has been paid out by the state, with \$27,326,404.57 in potential film tax credits that remain eligible to be claimed under the tax credit program.

## **Cash Rebate Program:**

During FY 2025, there were no Certificate of Completion requests approved and paid out by the state under the film incentive (direct cash rebate) program. These incentives are cash assistance under appropriated funding. Under Section 29 of the MSF Act, all projects approved in 2012 and thereafter are reported in the online Michigan Film and Digital Media Office (MFDMO) Dashboard, which can be found at: [www.michiganbusiness.org/industries/mfdmo/film](http://www.michiganbusiness.org/industries/mfdmo/film).

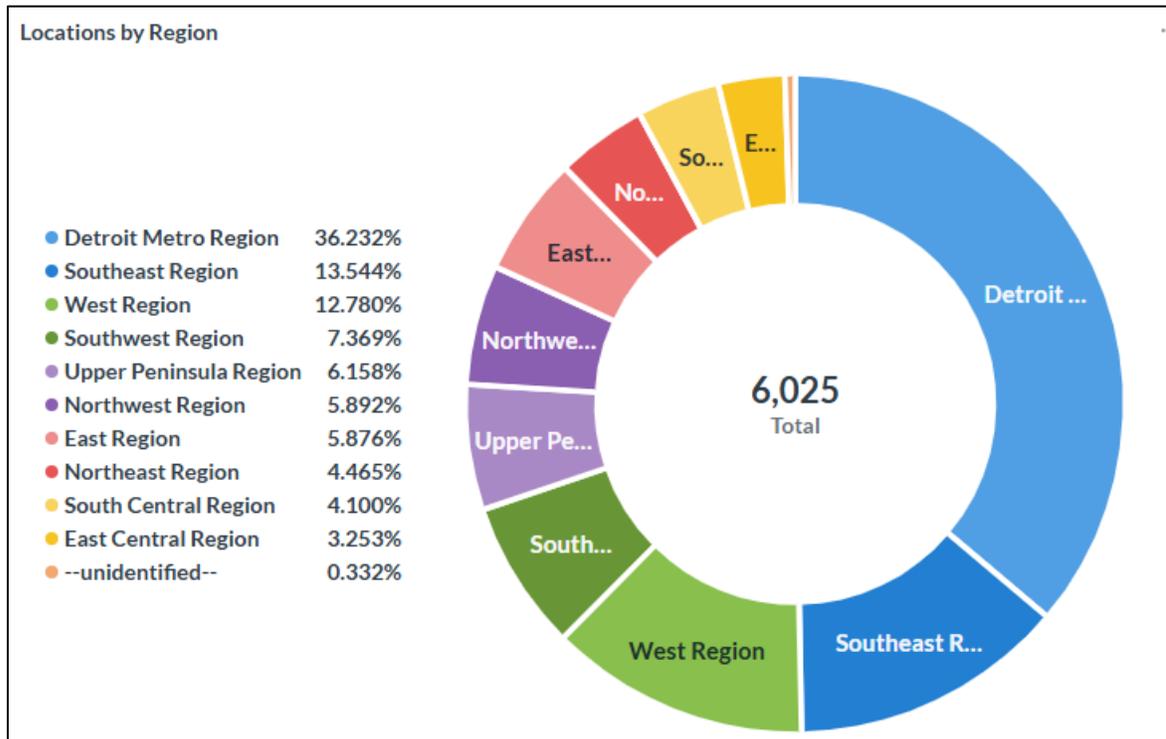
## General Services Provided

Often the first point of contact for productions, the MFDMO provides the following services to create an attractive business climate that supports domestic and international production activity from around the world and connects them with Michigan's film industry talent and crews. These services are offered free of charge to all professional or student productions film in state.

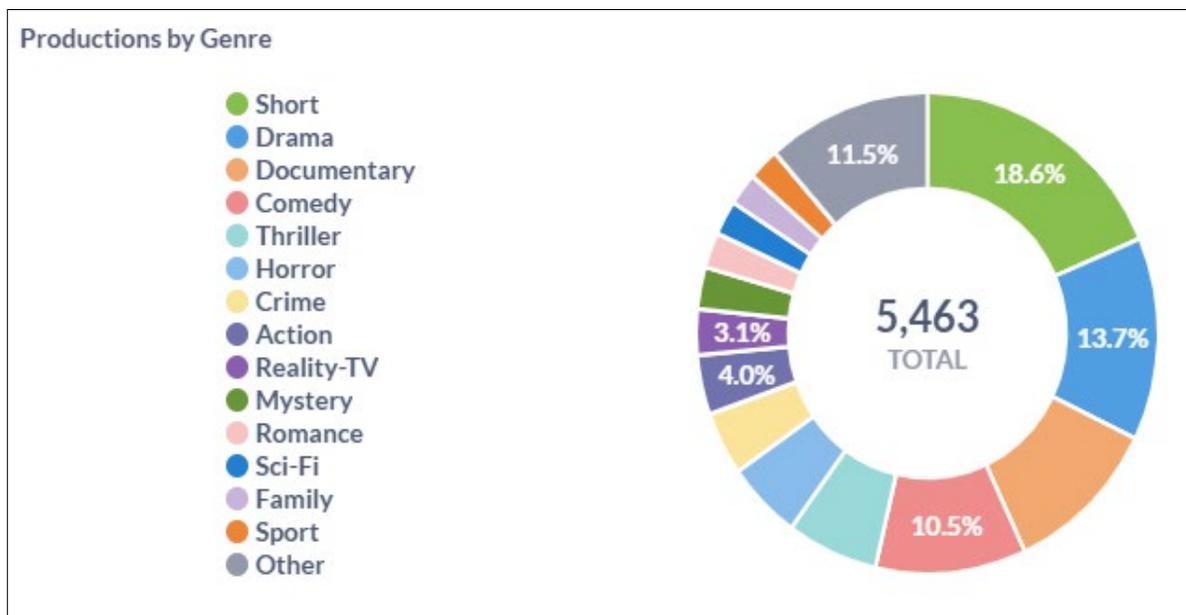
<b>Website</b>	The MFDMO website provides information about the operation of MFDMO and the services it provides. It is the one-stop shop to connect productions with Michigan's skilled film industry talent and crew to launch their projects and match their scripts and settings to Michigan's diverse locations. Beyond the frequently used Production Directory and Locations Gallery, the website houses resources for educators, students, filmmakers, and game developers. <b>Production Directory</b>	The Michigan Production Directory is a searchable database which features 4,401 crew, gaming and vendor listings that provide support services for the film and digital media industries. Michigan-based residents seeking work in the industry and Michigan vendors interested in securing film and production company clients are invited to create accounts to post their resumes and services here free of charge.
<b>Location Directory</b>	The Michigan Locations Gallery is an online database created expressly for filmmakers, film studios, production companies and property owners. It is housed on the MFDMO website and is also integrated into the Reel-Scout Locations Hub website. Whereas the Hub is a global marketplace where productions that are undecided on their region of interest can survey and filter through locations from around the world (including Michigan), the MFDMO website is curated specifically to Michigan locations. This is a complimentary resource provided to assist productions in their site-selection process and win their business to the state. The type of projects include, but are not limited to, film and television productions, commercials, still photography shoots, and miscellaneous events. It currently houses 87,143 photos representing 6,025 locations/properties throughout Michigan.

Location Scouting	Location scouting services are primarily leveraged by out-of-state productions surveying states across the nation for their projects. The MFDMO has provided 880 customized location packages to date. Beyond a referral to locations in the Gallery, the MFDMO connects productions to Michigan-based location managers/scouts listed in the Production Directory.
Contacts	2,796 total contacts (project, locations, etc.).
Traffic	There have been 323,656 visits to the Productions Directory and Locations Gallery.
Permitting	Assist local and out-of-state clients on permitting issues at the municipal, county, state and federal levels of government.
Film Tourism Archive	Reel-Tourism, the film tourism module of the MFDMO's Reel-Scout system, is a data bank of all 5,463 productions that have filmed at least one location from somewhere in Michigan. This archive of production activity is reserved for the MFDMO and partner tourism organizations to create maps, interactive tours, even mobile apps, that would allow film tourists to visit the locations as seen in the films they love. Reel-Tourism allows the State of Michigan to leverage all productions shot in the state that the public want to see and visit. It is a boon for the state on both the production and the tourism level.
Note	While no new credits or incentives can be offered through the Michigan Film and Digital Media Production Assistance Program, the MFDMO continues to process incentive claims for previously awarded projects, which is described previously in this report under Michigan Film Incentives.

The Michigan Locations Gallery modified to create the first-ever multi-property account for Michigan-based property owners. Better ease-of-use for local property owners means growing Michigan's location assets to attract the film industry.

### What is the Michigan Locations Gallery?

Powered by Reel-Scout, the Michigan Locations Gallery is an online database and public gallery of locations housed on the MFDMO website and is also integrated into the Reel-Scout Locations Hub website. Whereas the Hub is a global marketplace where productions that are undecided on their region of interest can survey and filter through locations from around the world (including Michigan), the MFDMO website is curated specifically to Michigan locations. This is a complimentary resource provided to assist productions in their site-selection process and win their business to the state. The types of projects include but are not limited to film and television productions, commercials, still photography shoots, and miscellaneous events. It currently showcases 87,143 photos representing 6,025 locations/properties throughout Michigan.

### Issue:

The Michigan Locations Gallery is an online database created expressly for filmmakers, film studios, production companies and property owners. Property owners interested in marketing their locations to the film industry are required to submit locations one by one. This can be cumbersome for property owners with multiple locations to submit.

### Solution:

The MFDMO initiated a first-ever multi-property account or "group designation" with a Michigan-based property owner. This allows the property owner to more efficiently upload and manage their locations and, thereby, equips the MFDMO with a more abundant and diverse selection of locations to present to the film industry for their projects. Same toolkit, new functionality.

## **Michigan Film and Digital Media Office Supports Computer Science Education**

In alignment with the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) strategic plan, the MFDMO works to foster high-wage skills growth in the technology sector by increasing computer science education through several initiatives, including collaborating with D-Hack 2024.

### **D-Hack 2024 Seventh Annual Impact Report:**

The seventh annual D-Hack, or Detroit Hackathon, hosted and organized by Accelerate4KIDS®<sup>®</sup>, took place at Western International High School on Saturday, December 7, 2024. This free, one-day event brought together high school students from Detroit public and charter schools for a 12-hour challenge focused on Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Machine Learning (ML). Participants competed in teams to create innovative AI/ML solutions while learning about computer science, marketing, and entrepreneurship through guest speakers and workshops.

The D-Hack challenged participants to design an original business using AI technology, develop a business model, and present their idea to judges. No prior experience was required, as students were taught the necessary skills during the event. Teams, consisting of three to five members, included roles such as programmer, marketer, and entrepreneur. Teams were either self-formed or assigned at the start of the hackathon.

Throughout the day, students had the opportunity to attend technical, marketing, and business workshops. Programmers participated in workshops that focused on using AI and Flowise AI to design agents for their business. Marketers attended workshops that covered strategies for promoting their business on social media and creating a website. Entrepreneurs learned how to develop a business model using Lean Canvas and how to present during pitches.

The goal of the workshops was to provide students with the knowledge needed to build a successful business. Students applied what they learned by sharing insights with their teams and working together to integrate the information into their business plans. The teams then developed a presentation to pitch their business ideas to a panel of judges, who scored them based on a specific rubric. Prizes included \$1,000 for first place, \$500 for second place, and \$250 for third place.

## Planning:

The D-Hack Planning Committee consists of four groups including the Administrative, Technology, Marketing and Recruiting committees. The roles and responsibilities for each committee include the following:

- The Administrative Group's roles include event coordination and budget management. They oversaw the overall planning and execution of the hackathon, ensuring that all logistical aspects, such as venue, scheduling, and registration, are organized and managed effectively. In addition, they developed and monitored the budget for the event, ensuring funds are allocated appropriately and expenses are tracked to maintain financial accountability.
- The Technology Group's roles include technical support and AI platform development. They developed the Flowise AI curriculum for the hackathon and instructed the participants on how to effectively implement the technology in their business design. They also aided with the setup and maintenance of all technological equipment and software used during the hackathon, ensuring that participants have access to necessary tools and resources.
- The Marketing Group's roles include marketing strategy and curriculum development for workshops. They developed and executed a marketing plan to promote the hackathon through various channels, including updating D-Hack landing page on Accelerate4KIDS® website, social media (Facebook, Instagram and Twitter), Detroit Public Schools Community District, and community organizations like University of Detroit Mercy iDRAW (Innovative Detroit's Robotic Agile Workforce), DAPCEP (Detroit Area Pre-College Engineering Program) and CMU (Central Michigan University) TRIO, to maximize participant engagement. They also created promotional materials, including flyers, banners, and digital content, to establish a cohesive brand identity for the D-Hack event and attract sponsors and participants.
- The Recruiting Group's roles include participant outreach and mentor and judge recruitment. They identified and engaged in student recruitment from various high schools to encourage diverse participation in the hackathon, ensuring a broad range of ideas and talents are represented. In addition, the recruited industry professionals and experienced mentors volunteer and guide participants during the event and serve as opening remarks and judges, enhancing the overall educational experience and credibility of the hackathon.

For eight months, May through November, D-Hack committee members volunteered and joined one or more of the following groups to support the planning. Each group met independently but they all came together monthly to update the committee of their status. They were committed to making sure the event was fun, safe, educational and provided a lifelong experience.

## **Marketing:**

Information about the D-Hack event was posted on the Accelerate4KIDS® website, along with a registration link for interested participants. To further promote the event, posts were shared on the Accelerate4KIDS® Foundation's official Facebook account, ensuring broad visibility across social media platforms. These efforts helped to raise awareness of the event and drive engagement with potential participants.

## **Sponsorship:**

Our team successfully secured sponsorships from several esteemed organizations, including Ford Philanthropy, CS for Detroit, Kapor Foundation, Detroit Public Schools, Accelerate4KIDS®, and AccelerateKID. The support from these sponsors was instrumental in making the D-Hack a reality.

## **Recruitment:**

Recruiting individuals and participants was a crucial aspect of the D-Hack's success. We worked tirelessly to secure guest speakers, judges, volunteers, and students to participate in the event.

For guest speakers, we successfully enlisted Michigan Lieutenant Governor Garlin Gilchrist III and Alycia Meriweather, the Deputy Superintendent of Detroit Public Schools Community District (DPSCD), both of whom returned to lend their support and provide inspiring words. In addition, we recruited a distinguished panel of judges, including Emmy Award-winning news anchor Carolyn Clifford from WXYZ-Ch 7, CS Equity Programs Project Director Kalisha Davis from CS For Detroit and the Kapoor Foundation, CS and STEM Enrichment Director LaShawn Sims from DPSCD, and Community Engagement Director Dave Greenwood from Detroit Police Academy League.

To recruit students, we organized in-school visits to both Detroit Public Schools and Charter Schools. During these visits, we delivered presentations about the D-Hack, showcasing what previous events had been like and explaining how students could get involved. We distributed flyers containing event details and encouraged students to register. Over the course of two months, we successfully recruited about seventy students, exceeding our goal of fifty participants.

## **Conclusion:**

The event saw the formation of seven student teams, and 29 volunteers that assisted with various tasks, including registration, logistics, and activities throughout the day. After 12 hours of intense collaboration and competition, we concluded the hackathon by announcing the winners.



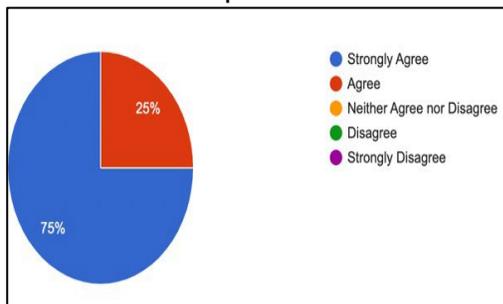

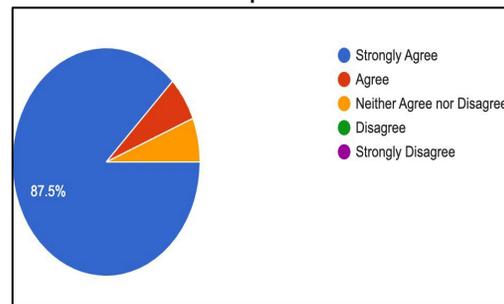
**Feedback:**

The results from our D-Hack event reflect an overwhelmingly positive experience for students, with 100% indicating they would eagerly return if given the opportunity (Graph A). Feedback from the post-event survey revealed that nearly 90% of attendees found the instructors, mentors, and staff to be instrumental in supporting their projects, highlighting the effectiveness of our team in fostering a collaborative and encouraging environment (Graph B).

Additionally, our Net Promoter Score of 75 underscores the high level of satisfaction among participants, indicating a strong likelihood of them recommending the event to their peers.
