FY 2024 Michigan Talent Partnership Program Report

BACKGROUND:

Public Act 121 of 2024, the FY 2025 Omnibus Budget, was signed into law on July 24, 2024, and established the Michigan Talent Partnership Program. This one-time appropriation of up to \$25 million into the Revitalization and Placemaking Fund consistent with Section 696 of the Income Tax Act of 1967, 1967 PA 281, MCL 206.696 to implement transformational public space development projects in central city neighborhoods or concentrated districts and leverage interdepartmental and cross-sector coordination through local talent plans designed to increase Michigan's population of young talent by creating high-density, high-amenity, walkable, vibrant street life neighborhoods or districts, and to create business ownership opportunities for local residents.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW:

In today's knowledge-driven economy, talent attracts capital and quality of place attracts talent. The Michigan Talent Partnership Program aims to retain and attract young residents by creating dense, walkable, and vibrant neighborhoods/districts in Michigan's central cities - the kinds of places that highly educated workers are flocking to today. Based on the boilerplate language, up to \$17,460,000 will be allocated to one project in each of four cities: Detroit, Grand Rapids, Lansing and Ann Arbor with grant awards of \$500,000-\$17,460,000. The remainder of the funding is reserved for projects across the state, up to a maximum total of \$6,790,000.

APPLICATION & SELECTION PROCESS:

To encourage broad based community support for the project, eligible applicants for a grant must be a consortium of entities that may include local economic development organizations, the nonprofit community, and the business community. Each consortium must include the chief administrator or executive of the local government where the project funding will be expended. Applicants will be eligible to receive technical assistance from a selected third-party consultant beginning in spring 2025 to support the development of a robust qualified talent plan proposal, with draft plans anticipated in summer 2025. A draft Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) was submitted to the four cities in February 2025 to allow local planning to begin.

ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES:

Competitive proposals will clearly demonstrate a defined implementation area, how the plan will increase Michigan's population of young talented workers, how funds will be used, identification of stakeholders engaged, local or private match funds committed, proposed implementation timeline and plan's sustainability, measurable outcomes, transition of roadway usage from cars to alternative transportation spaces, commercial corridor activation, mixed-use development, and a plan to support greater density, increase access to affordable or middle-income housing, improve direct access to multi-modal transportation and improve quality of life through various amenities.
